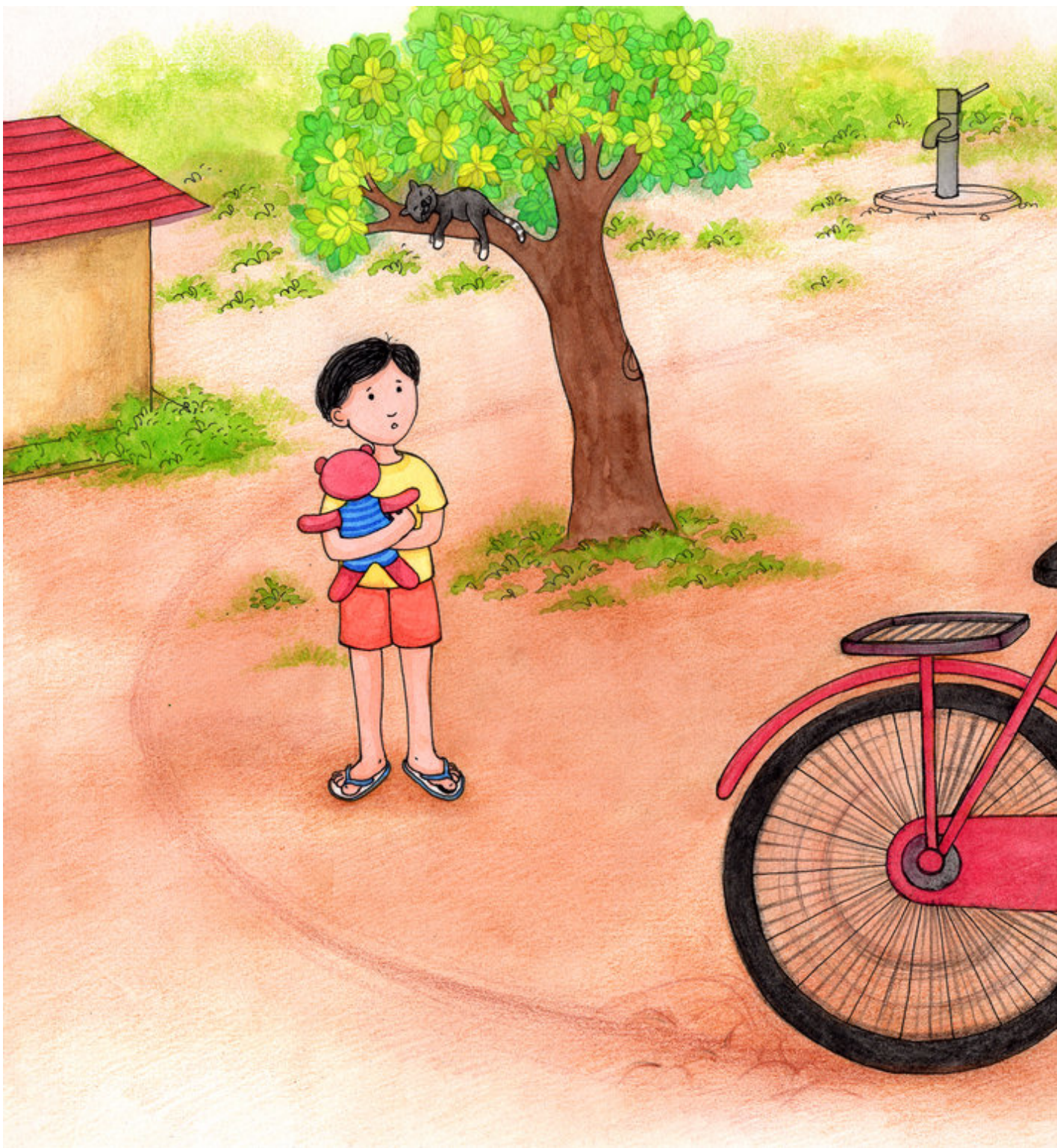

"May I ride your bicycle?" I asked Didi.



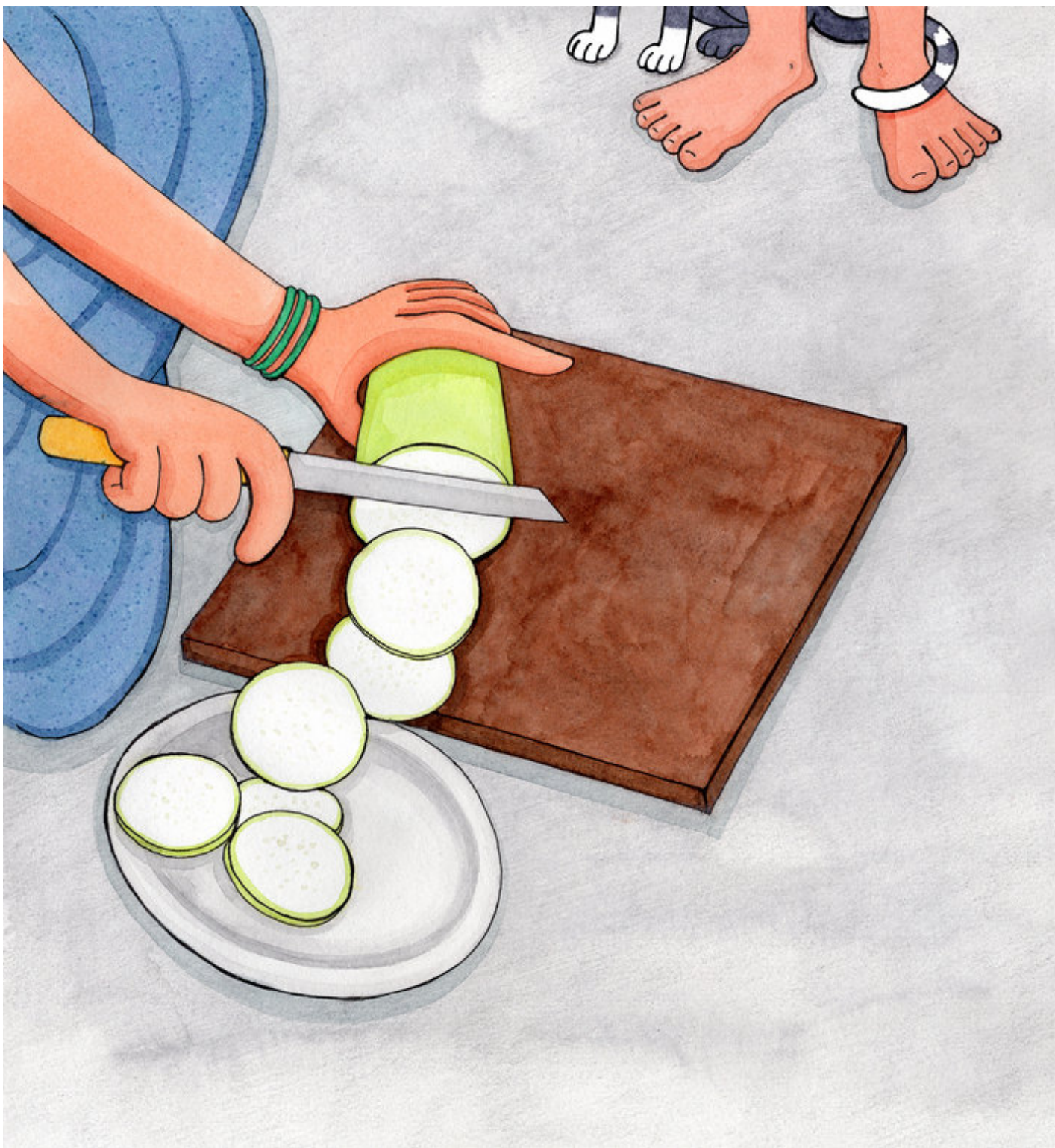
"No," Didi said.
